Victoria Police have created a Rotary supported interactive public website to help solve the tragedies of missing persons. Nationally, more than 35,000 people go missing each year, and though most are soon re-located, more than 1600 remain on the missing-person list. Links on the VicPol site take inquirers to more details about missing individuals, support services, Crime Stoppers and advice. The site also meshes with Facebook and Twitter. # A new chapter opens for libraries

Libraries have become hubs after embracing technology, **Bridie Byrne** reports

LIBRARIES today are far more than bricks and mortar that house books.

Once thought to be going the way of traditional bookstores, libraries have rebounded and are thriving in a technology-savvy world.

Australian Library and Information Association chief executive Sue McKerracher said with the help of innovation and re-imagination libraries were embracing new technologies while creating dynamic community centres.

Ms McKerracher said their popularity wasn't waning,

with about a third of the Australian population holding a library card and libraries receiving more than 110 million visits a year.

"It's less about book borrowing these days although it's at the core of what we do," she said.

"We are seeing libraries being renovated and a rejuvenation of the space to make sure it's contemporary, current and attractive to users."

Ms McKerracher said libraries had become learning, creative and meeting spaces as well as an access point to a growing collection

of mobile and online e-books, computers and the internet.

Robots that allow people to take part in library events remotely, access to 3D printers and computer coding classes are among the more futuristic activities at libraries these days.

Public Libraries Victoria Network executive officer Christine Mackenzie said libraries would need to stay up to date with technology to remain viable.

Victoria has 47 public library services, 262 branch libraries and 27 mobile libraries.

Victorian library users are the biggest item borrowers in the country according to the 2014-15 Australian Public Libraries Statistical Report.

Physical items lent in Victoria totalled 46.9 million and e-books lent totalled 890,931.

But public library funding was the most in NSW with \$363 million followed by Victoria, \$253 million; and Queensland, \$228 million.

Ms Mackenzie said because of the municipal rates cap councils were under more financial pressure making it harder for libraries to attract funding.

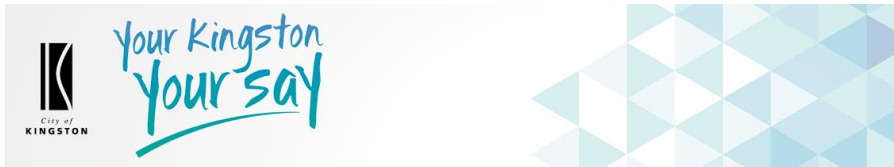
