# Guest Speaker: VFL/AFL FOOTBALL EVOLUTION – NOEL JENKINSON

Some people might say that football evolution is an oxymoron, but our ex-Richmond/South Melbourne footballer, Noel (1975-1981) gave us a very informative account of the changes to football from the 1970's to the present. When he played in the Under 19's, he received the grand total of \$3.00 a match. The highest paid players were on \$100,000, whereas now they are on or over \$1,000,000 a season. All matches started at 2.00 p.m. on a Saturday; now we have matches from Thursday – Sunday at varying times.

There have been many rule changes over the years, some are worthwhile, some are highly controversial. They include the 1976 introduction of the



centre square, 1980 Interchange, 1981 50-metre rule, 1995 tripping rule and 1997 abusive language to an umpire. (Some fans regard this last change as a backward step in football, as umpires often plainly need help to make the correct decision in certain situations, as they obviously suffer from undiagnosed ophthalmological deficiencies, blatant team biases and/or an unexplained temporary lack of mental faculties. The errors of their totally illogical decisions during a kerfuffle were sometimes so serious that many spectators vigorously asserted their opinions, including that of the timing of the umpires' birth relative to their parents' marriage, and provided loud, non-professional assessments of their ocular capabilities, or the lack thereof.)

In 2017 the League introduced the <u>AFLW</u>, which has now dramatically expanded, and was recently the fastest growing sport in the country. The only things growing faster are the <u>prices of food at the footy</u>.

<u>Gambling</u> has become a <u>huge problem</u> affecting the League. Noel also ran through the different gameplay styles of each team. It was interesting to hear the many variations of strategies and tactics which are designed to win matches.



Many questions were fired at Noel, which, the consummate professional that he is, he took in his stride; it was nice to hear his objective (ex-player, now spectator) view of <u>the game</u>.

Fun fact: The AFL reported an underlying operating surplus of \$27.7 million in 2023, compared with an underlying operating surplus of \$20.7 million in 2022 - an increase of \$7 million. This result includes the AFL's controlled state subsidiaries, Marvel Stadium and Champion Data.
